Overview of How SB 1127 Changed Charitable Gaming Policy

- Stricter restrictions on who may conduct charitable gaming
- Stricter restrictions on where it may be conducted
- Increased oversight of reporting of receipts from charitable gaming
- Limitations on Charitable Gaming Board actions

Stricter Restrictions on Charitable Organizations

- Stricter requirements for charitable organizations to be eligible
 - Before: Qualified if "operated exclusively for religious, charitable, community or educational purposes"
 - After: Must have 501(c) status and are limited to \$40,000 in gross receipts
- Required registration with VDACS
 - Before: Didn't have to register if less than \$40,000 in gross receipts
 - After: Registration required, but exempt from application and audit fees

Stricter Restrictions on Bingo, Pull Tabs, and Seal Cards

- Requirement that bingo, pull tabs, and seal cards be conducted only in the home locality
 - Before: Could conduct these games throughout the Commonwealth
 - After: Only in the organization's home locality
- Prohibition of conducting these games at an ABC licensee
 - Before: Could conduct these games at an ABC-licensed location
 - After: May do so only if the organization is the ABC license holder
- Neither of these restrictions apply to veterans lodges or fraternal organizations

Increased Oversight of Gross Receipts

- Percentage of receipts dedicated to charitable purposes is set by statute
 - Before: Board authorized to set percentage by regulation
 - After: Frozen at its current number (10%) until this Subcommittee completes its study
- Prohibition of deducting from gross receipts the organization's expenses to third-party operators
 - Before: Some organizations that conducted Texas Hold'em deducted these expenses, reducing their reported gross receipts
 - After: May not deduct this kind of expense

Limits on Board Actions

- Exemption from the 18-device limit for instant bingo, pull tabs, and seal cards
 - Before: Charitable Gaming Board could waive the limit
 - After: Prohibited from waiver
- Denying permits for legal violations
 - Before: Board was authorized, but not required, to deny or revoke a permit for certain violations
 - After: Required to do so
